

Draft Minutes of the One Hundred Fifty-First Stated Meeting of The Presbytery of Arkansas

October 28-29, 2022

Friday, October 28, 2022

The 151st Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Arkansas was hosted by First Presbyterian Bentonville. The in-person meeting also was comprised of a livestreaming component on Friday and a Zoom component Saturday.

Call to Order and Opening Prayer

The 151st Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Arkansas was called to order by the gavel tapping, lighting of the Christ candle, by Moderator MWS Susan Arnold who asked for opening prayer by Rob Button at 6:35 pm on October 28, 2022.

Introductions, Welcome, and Declaration of a Quorum

Moderator Arnold welcomed all the attendees and expressed how happy she was to finally have the chance to meet in person again. She explained that the worship on Friday would be led by the presbytery staff and that the offering to be collected will benefit the Food Pantry at First Bentonville.

MWS Stewart Smith, General Presbyter, welcomed all attendees including corresponding members, first-time commissioners, and visitors saying that the last time everyone met in person was March 4, 2020. He expressed gratitude for the staff at First Bentonville for accepting to be the

meeting's last minute host due to First United at Fayetteville having HVAC issues. He thanked the musicians *Calvin Street* with Rob Button, Richard Lee and Don Steinkraus, for handling the change in venue with grace. He introduced the presbytery staff, starting with the presbytery's new stated clerk, MWS Blake Brinegar, also the pastor at First Searcy. He explained that Blake had been on the job about 30 days and asked for patience and compassion while he gets situated in the new role. He introduced Kim Palmer, the administrator at the presbytery and the one taking minutes for the meeting. He said that the Presbytery Builder, Carol Clark, will be assisting in the worship service to be held tonight and Presbytery Connector, Julie Price was at the Registration Desk assisting late arrivals. MWS Brianne Christiansen, Youth and Young Adult Ministries Director, was on live stream. He introduced the non-paid presbytery staff, Moderator MWS Susan Arnold and explained that there is no vice moderator to be elected tomorrow as RE Ray Woodward resigned from the position a month ago. He said that RE Mike Szabo from First Searcy was nominated to be the moderator of the presbytery in 2023 and he agreed to serve if he is elected in March 2023. He added that the treasurer for the presbytery is RE Tom Verdery from First United in Fayetteville.

Moderator Arnold called on Stated Clerk Brinegar who described the hybrid meeting and the voting process. He said that folks would watch the live stream Friday night and participate in Zoom on Saturday and asked in-person participants to limit their use of wi-fi to preserve the bandwidth for online.

A quorum for the stated meeting is at least 20 Ruling Elders and 20 Ministers of the Word and Sacrament with at least 20 congregations represented overall, as approved at the February 10, 2018 Stated Meeting. A quorum was present with a total of 142 registered, of whom 97 could vote. The attendance is included in the Appendix as Section I.

Moderator Arnold announced that the appointed tellers were: RE Alice Kutz, First Springdale; RE Leigh Woodruff, First United Fayetteville; RE Michael Squires First Bentonville and RE Nate Burdick, First Bentonville.

Moderator Arnold welcomed host church pastor, MWS Katie Cummings who welcomed the attendees to the meeting and introduced MWS Georgia Senor as the associate pastor and said that they were delighted to say "yes" when asked if First Bentonville could host the 151st meeting.

Consent Agenda and Stated Clerk's Report

Moderator Arnold moved to the Consent Agenda and Stated Clerk Brinegar presented the Consent Agenda and explained that all motions may be voted on as one and anyone is welcome to remove any item for discussion. Moderator Arnold asked if anyone wanted an item removed. No changes were made. Moderator Arnold entertained a motion, one was made and seconded. The motion passed unanimously. The consent agenda may be found in the Appendix, Section II. Stated Clerk Brinegar said that being new to the position, the clerk's report is short and does have the 2023 Prayer List for Congregations which can be found in the Appendix, Section III. The meeting then moved into worship.

Worship

A copy of the worship bulletin may be found in the Appendix, Section IV. Worship began at 7 p.m. with a prelude, *Gather Us In*, led by *Calvin Street*, musicians and MWS Rebecca Spooner read 1 Corinthians 12:4-31 and led the sermon, "Showing Up." As of November 10, 2022, \$2,079.00 has been collected to benefit the food pantry at First Bentonville. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was led by MWS Smith and MWS Clark.

The life and legacy of Rev. Dr. Gordon F. Garlington, III, was celebrated with the announcement of a \$50,000 gift by his wife, Shirley Garlington, given to the presbytery. The fund will be used to "bring the presbytery together" recognizing Gordon's love of gathering and working together in ministry. The fund will be available for others to contribute to it. Members of the Garlington family were also recognized during the celebration.

Everyone was invited to attend a reception held in the Fellowship Hall to honor the generous gift given to the presbytery to create the Rev. Dr. Gordon F. Garlington III Memorial Fund. The Christ Candle was extinguished and the meeting was adjourned until 8:30 a.m. Saturday morning.

Saturday, October 29, 2022

Call Back to Order with the Lighting of the Christ Candle

The 151st Stated Meeting of the Presbytery of Arkansas continued Saturday morning with Moderator MWS Susan Arnold calling the 151st Meeting of the Presbytery of Arkansas back to order at 8:35 am with the lighting of the Christ candle. Stated Clerk Brinegar explained the technology of Zoom and welcomed attendees on Zoom and explained the electronic voting process. Technical Moderator RE Julie Gillaspy was monitoring Zoom to help with questions and counting votes.

Stated Clerk Brinegar recognized first time commissioners: Those in person were—RE Catherine Henry of Fayetteville, First United: RE Leigh Woodruff of Fayetteville, First United; RE Kim Dunnagan of Little Rock, Second; RE Garry Mertins of Little Rock, Second; RE Tamara Boggs of North Little Rock, Park Hill; RE Catherine Rew of Bella Vista Presbyterian; RE Beth Bradshaw of Wynne Presbyterian; and RE Becky McGaughey of Yellville, First. Those on Zoom were—RE Tara Williams of Arkadelphia, First; RE Mike Landry of Mena, First; and RE Moira Donnell of Little Rock, Grace. In person was also Rev. Angela Tyler-Williams was also a first time attendee.

Theological Discussion led by Matthew 25 Task Force

The service was turned over to Mathew 25 Task Force who led the Theological Discussion entitled, "Race Reconciliation – Beginning the Dialog." The worship bulletin may be found in the Appendix, Section V. Members of the task force are: Co-Chairs MWS Steven Kurtz and CRE Peg Falls-Corbitt, RE Dick Freer, MWS Marie Mainard O'Connell, RE Susan Morris, RE Willie Morris, CRE Claire Rhodes, and RE David Webb.. RE Willie Morris led the Theological Discussion with scripture reading and message. CRE Falls-Corbitt led the discussion with an

introduction to different types of discrimination. Breakout sessions were held for participants to engage in small group discussion. Participants reconvened and were given the opportunity to hear final thoughts and ask questions. MWS Stephen Kurtz discussed resources that are available online to study Matthew 25 issues and a copy of the information can be found in the Appendix, Section VI.

Business of the Presbytery

Committee on Nominations Report

Moderator Susan Arnold reconvened the meeting at 10:30 a.m. The moderator confirmed that the tellers were present at the meeting. Moderator CRE Chuck Olson gave the report of the Committee on Nominations. The committee members are: RE Mary Shaw, MWS Lindy Vogado, RE Wynona Bryant-Williams, MWS Bob Hadley, MWS David Schaller, RE Ed Wilkinson, MWS Catherine Allsbury and RE Jane Anne Spikes. He explained the role of the committee and how the work affects the direction of the presbytery and the selection process by race, gender, ages, backgrounds, etc. He invited participants to provide names of qualified persons or themselves to serve on a committee or ministry area. Forms are available on the presbytery's web site under Resources, Presbytery Documents, under Nominations or click this Link. He presented the slate to be elected for various classes and moved that they be approved. Moderator Arnold said that the slate of nominees was before the participants, asked for any nominations from the floor and from zoom. There were none and the motion carried unanimously. The slate of those elected may be found in the Appendix, Section VII.

Future of the Church Committee Report

Moderator Arnold called MWS Stephen Kurtz, moderator of the Future of the Church Committee to give the committee report. A slideshow played while he described grants received by churches. He discussed two books that were given away at the display table in the exhibit hall, *Secrets of a Secret Shopper*, about reaching and keeping church guests and *The Art of Gathering* which will be the subject of a book discussion group by Zoom in 2023. The committee written report is available in the Appendix, Section VIII.

Solar Under the Sun Report

Moderator Arnold called on MWS Elizabeth Brinegar, Director of Operations for Solar Under the Sun, to give a report. MWS Brinegar highlighted projects Solar Under the Sun has been working on such as Solar School being open at Ferncliff again, \$20,000 that was gifted for solar power in Haiti; \$10,000 that was gifted to start a remote Cherident, Haiti medical clinic, and seven solar systems were also installed in Haiti. The first trip back to Haiti after Covid is planned to happen in 2023..

Committee on Ministry Report

Moderator Arnold called on RE Jane Webb to give the report for the Committee on Ministry. RE Webb stated that she is the vice moderator in for moderator MWS Leslie Belden who was unable

to attend. She referred attendees to the addendum packet and review the motions listed there. She moved on Motion #1 which was the call for MWS Susan Arnold as the Pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Springdale. It was from the committee and didn't require a second.

1. Motion to approve the call of MWS Susan Arnold as Pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Springdale, effective October 3, 2022, with the following terms of call, approved at a duly called congregational meeting on August 14:

Moderator Arnold verified that a voice vote would be acceptable instead of a hand vote. She called for a vote for in-person and on zoom. It was unanimous and the motion carried. MWS Susan Arnold, and the members of First Presbyterian Church of Springdale were congratulated and recognized by the presbytery.

RE Webb moved Motion #2 of the COM's report, which was the call of MWS Yvonne Thurmond as Pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Yellville and her enrollment as a member of the Presbytery of Arkansas. The motion came from the committee and didn't require a second. A copy of her Statement of Faith can be found in the Appendix, Section IX, Exhibit A.

2. Motion to approve the call of MWS Yvonne Thurmond as Pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Yellville, effective November 1, 2022, and enroll her as a member of the Presbytery of Arkansas, requesting that Western North Carolina Presbytery dismiss her, with the following terms of call, approved at a duly called congregational meeting on October 9:

Moderator Arnold called for a vote for in-person and on zoom. It was unanimous and the motion carried. MWS Yvonne Thurmond, members of her family, and the members of First Presbyterian Church of Yellville were congratulated and recognized by the presbytery. MWS Thurmond greeted the presbytery.

RE Webb moved Motion #3 of the Committee on Ministry report, which is the approval of a Temporary Member of the Presbytery, which comes from the committee and doesn't require a second.

3. Motion to approve and enroll the following as a Temporary Member of the Presbytery of Arkansas: Rev. Barry Anderson, serving in a temporary pastoral relationship at First Presbyterian Church of Paragould. Rev. Anderson is a member in good standing of the Cumberland Presbyterian denomination and has passed all of the requirements of the Presbytery of Arkansas and the Committee on Ministry for temporary membership in our presbytery.

Moderator Arnold called for a vote for in-person and on zoom. It was unanimous and the motion carried. She welcomed Rev. Barry Anderson, he was recognized and greeted the presbytery and thanked everyone

RE Webb made Motion #4 of the Committee on Ministry's report, which didn't require a second.

4. Motion to elect an Administrative Commission to work with the congregation of Park Hill Presbyterian Church with membership and authority as outlined below:

Park Hill Presbyterian Church North Little Rock, Arkansas Administrative Commission

Motion to the Presbytery of Arkansas to form an Administrative Commission with the following members and authority, and the responsibility to report to the Presbytery:

 - c. MWS Karen Akin, HR

 - a. Serve alongside Ruling Elders of Park Hill Presbyterian Church as full voting members of the Session;
 - b. Counsel the Session of Park Hill Presbyterian Church, North Little Rock, Arkansas, in the Session's discernment of God's future for the congregation;
 - c. Counsel the Session and membership of Park Hill Presbyterian Church, North Little Rock, Arkansas, in the Session's and congregation's deliberations and actions;
 - d. Serve as the presence of the Presbytery of Arkansas in all and any ways necessary; and
 - e. Assume original jurisdiction of the church, if necessary.
- 3. Reporting: The AC shall communicate to the Stated Clerk all actions taken on behalf of the presbytery. Actions shall be reported within two weeks of having been taken. (Email is a satisfactory way to report actions taken). Written reports of the AC's actions shall be submitted no less than 30 days prior to each stated meeting of the presbytery. Prior to dissolution, minutes of all meetings of the AC shall be submitted to the Stated Clerk.

Moderator Arnold called for a vote for in-person and on zoom. It was unanimous and the motion carried.

RE Webb moved Motion #5 of the Committee on Ministry's report, which came from the committee and didn't require a second and asked General Presbyter MWS Stewart Smith to speak to the motion.

5. Motion to approve requiring all Ministers of Word and Sacrament, Temporary Members of the Presbytery of Arkansas, Commissioned Ruling Elders, and any serving in a pastoral role in congregations of the Presbytery of Arkansas to take a course in "Boundaries Training" as offered by the Synod of the Sun or other means of taking a qualified course. (See the accompanying document in the Appendix Section IX, Exhibit B.) Boundaries training must be completed by all required before December 31, 2023, unless exempted by the Committee on Ministry.

General Presbyter Smith said that it's been a while since the presbytery had offered boundaries training and the Synod of the Sun offers the training. The training will be paid for by the Presbytery of Arkansas and tracked by the Synod of the Sun. Questions were asked and answered.

Moderator Arnold called for a vote for in-person and on zoom. It was unanimous and the motion carried.

RE Webb asked that the presbytery honor the minister members of the Presbytery who had joined the church eternal between meetings with a moment of silence. Minister of Word and Sacrament J.Q. Williams, HR, and Minister of Word and Sacrament Charles "Chuck" White, HR whose work on this earth has ended, Necrology information maybe be found in the written report from the Committee on Ministry in the Appendix, Section IX.

RE Webb asked the commissioners review the written information contained in the remainder of the report of the Committee on Ministry found in the Appendix, Section IX and her verbal report was concluded.

Ferncliff Report

Moderator Arnold called on Joel Gill, Director at Ferncliff, for his report. He had a slideshow demonstrating the work that Ferncliff is accomplishing and spoke on the work to be completed for site improvements. He said that they had just hosted YouthQuake and Presbytery Pilgrimage at the same time and they will host Solar School again.

Treasurer's Report

Moderator Arnold called on Treasurer RE Tom Verdery for his report. He stated that 2022 continues to be a challenging year in the financial markets. He projects that the Presbytery of Arkansas income will be consistent with the early year forecast and expenses will be below budget. He expressed his gratefulness to all of the congregations who contribute to church benevolence. He said that the financial review for 2021 was completed recently and read the auditor's statement, "Based on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting." He translated the CPA terms to everything is great and the presbytery is in solid standing. The presbytery has a financial review every five years and then a full audit in the sixth year. He also reported that the administration committee has reviewed the presbytery's insurance coverage in 2022. He said that he and the presbytery staff is studying and completing a review of insurance coverage for 2023 to ensure all presbytery property is adequately covered.. He said that the administration committee will have the 2023 Budget ready for review and approval for the March 2023 presbytery meeting. In the Appendix, Section X, the treasurer's written report, financial statements, the auditor's 2021 financial review and 2022 liability insurance certificate may be found.

General Presbyter's Report

Moderator Arnold asked for the General Presbyter's report. General Presbyter Smith echoed the work of the administration committee in regard to recognizing long term contributions from churches that are not going up but probably decline inevitably. The committee is working on how to make reserve funds available to our congregations for use. Last year, Future of the Church funded grants for congregations from funds outside the budget. Mission of the Church uses money in their budget to fund grants for congregations. He said that 25 percent of the presbytery's spend rate funds the budget.

He had words of gratitude for the staff. In 2018-19, MWS Leslie Roper led a task force that designed matching staffing with structure and the reason that worked was the individuals who applied for the positions. Carol Clark, Julie Price, Brianne Christiansen, and Kim Palmer have the creativity and willingness to roll up their sleeves and work.

He reported YouthQuake went well in spite of a downpour and storms. He thanked Ruth Amensen, MWS Jocelyn Wildwright, MWS Marie Mainard O'Connell, MWS Becky Purcell, MWS Elizabeth Brinegar, Grant Wright, Adam Alexander, and all of the chaperones for their work in making YouthQuake a success. He said that participation in all levels had increased.

Youth events are coming in 2023. On June 18-23 instead of Moranch, the junior high students will go to Ferncliff for Junior High Presbytery Week. The Youth@Presbytery event will happen at the March 2023 presbytery meeting.

He reported he anticipates several churches will officially close in 2023. He wanted to reiterate that the presbytery does not want church properties and are not ready to grab the church's assets. This is a huge challenge for all presbyteries as they acquire more property. We do our best in working with congregations, with the expense and manpower for management and insurance.

He said that there are challenges in pastoral leadership and hoping to help that issue is the University of the Ozarks program, Thriving in Rural Ministry. MSW Phil Blackburn has a cohort of six or seven pastors he has been working with in the last two years including working on a leadership academy.

He said that he was going to end his report with good news and showed a slideshow of four vacation homes to raffle a two-night stay during lunch. He said that the vacation homes that were graciously donated for a two night stay.

Staff Reports

Presbytery Builder MWS Carol Clark suggested everyone go to the presbytery's web site, www.presbyark.org, scroll to the bottom of the page and see Jason Tucker's valuable workshops. She reported on PresbyArkConnect, the presbytery's FaceBook page. She continues to fill pulpits, so contact her as she loves to come and visit the churches. She said she continues work with sessions and members outreach committees as she is the Presbytery Builder.

Presbytery Connector Julie Price had a slideshow that highlighted presbytery events over the last two years. She mentioned Carol Clark's House Calls, On the Road events, retreats, and workshops all that had joy and connection. She reminded everyone to get in the Directory, the presbytery's database for contacts, and to get on PresbyArkConnect. She reported that the presbytery wants everyone to be connected, share resources and tools they need to be able to meet their needs.

Announcements

Co-Moderators Phil Butin and Leigh Woodruff of the Honduran Ministry subcommittee are working on a spring break trip to Honduras in March 2023.

Cathy Rogers for Presbytery Women reminded everyone that there is a flyer in the packet for the Presbyterian Women's Day of Mission Gathering on Saturday, April 22, 2023 at Ferncliff to celebrate Earth Day.

Closing Prayer and Adjournment

Moderator Arnold called on MWS Katie Cummings, pastor of First Bentonville, to offer the closing prayer. She extinguished the Christ candle, tapped the gavel and adjourned the meeting at 12:00 p.m. She thanked everyone for showing up and doing the work of the presbytery. Invited everyone to lunch in the Fellowship Hall and for the raffle. The homes offered were: Tom and Barbara Verdery's home on Beaver Lake, won on Saturday by RE Jane Webb; Don and Mari Eilbott's home on the Red River was won by Barbara Allen; Collins Andrew and Jeannie Ford's home on Lake Hamilton was won by MWS Stephen Kurtz and Ted Belden's home on Beaver Lake was won by MWS Karen Akin. The son of RE Tamara Boggs of Park Hill North Little Rock, Graham, was the one who drew the names out of a box of all entries.

Affirmation of Faith From the Confession of 1967

Jesus Christ is God with humankind. Christ is the eternal only begotten of God who became human and lived among us to fulfill the work of reconciliation.

ALL: Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and well fed,"

ALL: but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it?

In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds."

All: Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by my deeds. Do you want evidence that faith without deeds is useless? Was not our father Abraham considered righteous for what he did when he offered his son Isaac on the altar? You see that his faith and his actions were working together, and his faith was made complete by what he did. And the scripture was fulfilled that says, "Abraham believed God, and it was credited to him as righteousness," and he was called God's friend.

All: You see that a person is considered righteous by what they do and not by faith alone.

In the same way, was not even Rahab the prostitute considered righteous for what she did when she gave lodging to the spies and sent them off in a different direction?

ALL: As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead. Therefore go in peace, to love and serve the Lord with a faith that acts out of love.

Section VIII - Future of the Church (FOTC) Committee Report

The Future of the Church invites you to visit our display. On a *'first come first, served'* basis pick up a free book: The Art of Gathering or Secrets of a Secret Shopper. Both of these books have very pertinent applications to church life today and we'd love to get some of these into the hands of those who might not have run across them yet.

The Art of Gathering is a brilliant 'rethink' of the way we conceive of and handle our church get togethers. With Georgia Senor's leadership and drawing on the wisdom of this book, First Bentonville is conducting a series of gatherings "Conversations that Matter." Carol Clark, our Presbytery builder, has asked Georgia to lead us in a book discussion in the new year because the challenge of the book is not just reading it but applying it. Zooming together will allow time for discussion and visioning about how to make all of those gatherings that we hold more gracious and connective.

<u>Secrets of a Secret Shopper</u> may not leave you 'gasping with revelation,' but as a primer for *Church Welcome 101*, there are really not many more effective options. This book is a perfect tool for your 'welcome/membership/outreach' committees to study together and not just study but apply to your own situation. Read this book, then walk your campus and Sunday morning worship with the eyes of a visitor and you might be surprised how many small changes could be very important.

Members of the FOTC are always excited when we learn about our churches who are honestly grappling with 'being the church' in changing times, particularly in terms of worship and worship styles. We want to share 3 of those in our Presbytery with you.

- 1. First United Presbyterian Church in Fayetteville has just launched *Third Worship* which will meet on the third Sunday of each month at 4pm. Featuring 'rock type contemporary music,' this service is intended to appeal to college students, young families and their own youth who can worship and then gather for their Sunday youth programs. The 'sermon' is replaced by an introduction to a gospel reading and then a time for discussion in small groups, wrapping up with another song and a simple blessing. Another beautiful thing that is happening in this reformed and contemporary style of worship is that the youth of First Presbyterian Springdale came to worship, too. It doesn't get any better than worship and connection with other Presbyterians! To see the service, go to this link on YouTube (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=IzcVizCa_sE) or find them on their website/worship/streaming.
 - 2. In Fort Smith, a New Worshipping Community called *A Circle of Friends Gathering* has formed and meets starting with supper on the first and third Sundays of the month. After the meal, they gather in the living room of the Sweet House which was repainted and furnished using FOTC grants. They sit in a circle, light a candle, have a moment of meditative silence, take time to hold in the light anyone who expresses a concern, sing a song, then take turns leading a discussion topic. They end with the serenity prayer. The Gatherings are inclusive, informal, and non-hierarchical. Leadership is shared and volunteer. They have just started, but plan to add community service to their activities. https://circleoffriendsgathering.org/
 - 3. First in Little Rock is housing a new contemporary worship service that is reformed and open, welcoming to all, informal and filled with the spirit. The group committed to this new worship style has, with their own resources and volunteer musicians, created a different experience of worship. They are grateful to First Presbyterian for giving the space (and also the air-conditioning) to allow for a way to experiment with a new form other than traditional worship. Worship is at 9:30am each Sunday morning!

Draft Minutes October 28-29, 2022

The FOTC committee (with additional help from the Coordinating Team) awarded grants to 9 of our churches; 5 for help with technology, 1 for a consultant (Jason Tucker), 3 for community outreach events. It's GRANT TIME again. We invite all of you who are pondering endeavors that are aimed at strengthening or changing some directions in the life of your church to consider applying for a grant for 2023. Chuck White served in our presbytery as pastor of First Presbyterian Church of Mountain Home from 1992 until his retirement on July 31, 2004. In his retirement he eventually moved to Mooresville, NC where he died on June 30, 2022.

 - b. MWS Leslie Roper as Pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Batesville, effective June 12, 2022, approved by the congregation at a duly called congregational meeting on May 15, 2022.
 - c. MWS Krista Denne' as Pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Clarksville, effective January 1, 2023, approved by the congregation at a duly called congregational meeting at a date to be determined, so that MWS Denne' could transition into a temporary pastoral relationship role, as approved by the Committee on Ministry.
- 2. The Committee on Ministry granted authority for the following congregations to elect a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC):

Section IV – Exhibit A MWS Yvonne Thurmond Statement of Faith

I believe God is the creator of the universe and is self-revealing as one being in three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God's essential nature is everlasting love which is revealed in God's personal involvement in creation and with human beings in life-giving ways through various covenants.

I believe Jesus Christ is the eternal Word of God who 'took on flesh' and became Immanuel, God with us. He proclaimed the love of God to all through his preaching and ministry, especially those in need. Because the powers of his time "loved the darkness rather than the Light," Jesus was crucified; three days later he arose from the dead to demonstrate God's unfailing love for us and God's power over evil and death. Jesus is alive now in heaven where he intercedes for us and waits for the time of his return to earth for the final defeat of the powers of darkness.

I believe the Holy Spirit is the active presence of God in the world today. It is the Spirit who continues to reveal God's work in the world, interprets the Word of God, gives gifts to all people and empowers believers for discipleship and service in the Church and in the world. Through the work of the Holy Spirit believers are formed into the one Body of Christ, are able to work together for the good of all and become a transforming agency in the world.

I believe human beings are created in the image of God and therefore have worth as persons. As God is relational, so are human beings; we are meant to have life-affirming relationships with God, others and ourselves. Humanity, however, is tainted in every aspect of life by the effects of sin which causes chaos and destruction in those relationships. It is the mercy and grace of God in Christ through the indwelling Holy Spirit which saves us from those destructive forces, transforms our desires and actions and enables us to become who we are created to be.

I believe the Church includes all who are called to faith in Christ through the work of the Holy Spirit and that the church's primary work is the worship and service of God in the communities in which it is located. That work is accomplished through nurturing people in the faith, education in and interpretation of the Scripture, the celebration of the sacraments and participation with the Holy Spirit in transforming the lives of those in and out of the church through service and mission. I believe that the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper are tangible signs and seals of the work of God in the lives of his people. Through Baptism, we are called into new life and grafted into the Body of Christ, the Church, to be nurtured and sustained as we mature in discipleship of Christ and service to others. In the Lord's Supper, the Body of Christ gathers around the table of remembrance to express our gratitude for all that God has done for us, to reaffirm our commitment to each other and to receive nourishment for the work to which God has called us as individuals and as a covenant community.

Section IV – Exhibit B

Not-Your-Average Boundaries Training Offered by Synod of the Sun

It's the experience of those within the Synod of the Sun that pastors, church staff, and other leaders who transgress boundaries by-and-large are not predators. In fact, not even close. Most people in ministry who violate boundaries are individuals who know and follow the rules most of the time but whose judgment may be impaired due to an unusually stressful time in their lives.

With that in mind, Not-Your-Average Boundaries Training, offered by Synod of the Sun, is tailored to focus on strategies to foster mental health, emotional resiliency, and well-being. While this training still covers the requirements — "Don't sleep with a parishioner unless you're married to them" and the like —the best prevention is to encourage clergy to take steps to manage their stress in order to maintain balance and perspective when temptation arises. The program teaches a 3-step strategy to help stop the participant in their tracks before they commit a boundary violation; and participants leave with their own personal prevention plan.

This training is lively and interactive, full of reflection and conversation — and even laughter. Attendees have given the Synod feedback that this boundaries training was a great experience, AND caused them to re-evaluate some of their own practices.

Participants MUST take part in ALL five hours of training in order to receive the certificate of completion. Dates the training is offered are:

November 8-9, 2022 from 5:00 – 7:30 pm

February 6-7, 2023, from 9:30 am – noon

There are other options for meeting the requirements for boundaries training in addition to these two dates. The Synod of the Sun PCUSA is committed to ensuring that the presbyteries within its bounds provide safe places of worship and fellowship to everyone served. As part of that commitment, the Synod is providing information on Safe Gatherings as a resource for pastors and congregations in this important area. Safe Gatherings provides a 2-hour online course called "Clergy Ethics and Congregational Boundaries." In partnership with many presbyteries, the Synod is sponsoring this course as a means of meeting requirements for boundaries training.

Section X – Written Report of the Treasurer

For Information

- 1. While 2022 continues to be a challenging year in the financial markets, through September, the Presbytery of Arkansas is projecting income for 2022 to be consistent with our early year forecasts and expenses will be below budget. Early in the year there were still significant concerns over Covid impacting our ministry spending, which is why we are below budget. We continue to be grateful to all Church Benevolence contributions to the Presbytery of Arkansas.
- 2. Texas Presbyterian Foundation performance through September 2022 in their Balanced Pooled Funds is down approximately 23.4%. Fortunately, your Presbytery of Arkansas is in a strong cash flow position with significant funds in money market and checking accounts, eliminating any significant need to take money from the Balanced Pooled funds invested in stocks and fixed income.
- 3. We just completed our 2021 independent Financial Review from Landmark, Certified Public Accountants. The accounting firm's review came back with a solid review (see pages 29-47 in the Main Packet), showing no discrepancies or recommendations for modification of any of our financial statements.
- 4. The Administration Committee has had the presbytery's insurance review performed in 2022, which raised several questions including the need to increase the umbrella value for the 2022 renewal, verifying insured business items value versus insured amount, and ensuring all presbytery property has liability insurance. Also, the question was raised about which properties that are owned by the Presbytery, as the list is continually being updated as new properties have come on board. The Administration Committee, Treasurer and the Presbytery Staff are studying and addressing these questions to be well prepared for the insurance renewal for 2023. See accompanying document in the Main Packet, Section F –Exhibit V.
- 5. Your Committee on Administration will be bringing their proposed 2023 financial budget to our next Presbytery meeting (March 2023) for review and approval.
- 6. Our continued focus for 2022 and beyond will be creating programs and support to help all churches as they move back to normal activities post pandemic.



NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization and Operations

The Presbytery of Arkansas (the Presbytery) exists as a religious entity under the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). As such, their mission is to inspire, challenge and help the congregation, agencies, ministers, and leaders to fulfill the call to service as faithful followers of Jesus Christ.

The Presbytery is made up of 76 Presbyterian churches located throughout Arkansas. The membership of the Presbytery includes all Ministers of member churches and ruling elders elected by member congregations. The Committee on Administration oversees the budget, financial operations of the Presbytery and may designate certain assets to be used first as support for certain programs and activities and, if not needed, then for general operations. Principal revenues of the Presbytery are primarily from benevolence received from the member churches. All of the Presbytery's expenditures are for the programs which benefit these churches and members.

Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements are prepared using the modified cash basis of accounting. Under this basis, certain revenues and related assets are recognized when cash is received rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when they are paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. This basis differs from generally accepted accounting principles primarily because these financial statements do not include promises to give from church members or amounts due to vendors and employees for goods and services received prior to year-end for which payment had not been made as of year-end.

Basis of Presentation

The Presbytery presents information regarding financial position and activities according to the following two classes of net assets:

<u>Net Assets without Donor Restrictions</u>—Net assets that are not subject to or are no longer subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

<u>Net Assets with Donor Restrictions</u>—Net assets whose use is limited by donor-imposed time and/or purpose restrictions.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of demand deposit accounts maintained with financial institutions and cash and highly liquid investments with maturities of three months or less held by the Texas Presbyterian Foundation (TPF).

Investments

The Presbytery's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly fashion between market participants at the measurement date. Investment return includes realized and unrealized gains and losses and interest income received. Investment income and gains restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets

Presbytery of Arkansas without donor restrictions if the restrictions are met (either a stipulated time period ends or a purpose restriction is accomplished) during the reporting period in which the income and gains are

recognized and are appropriated for expenditure. Otherwise, income and gains are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions.

Notes Receivable

Notes Receivable consist of unsecured emergency pandemic loans to two churches within the region governed by the Presbytery. Notes remaining at December 31, 2021 and 2020, include one note in the original amount of \$10,000 at zero percent interest dated April 2020 and another note in the original amount of \$25,000 at zero percent interest dated March 2020, both of which are due within 24 months of the date of the note or upon sale of the church property, whichever occurs first.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at historical cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Major renewals and betterments in excess of \$1,000 are capitalized, while normal repairs and maintenance are expensed in the period incurred. Depreciation of these assets is calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, ranging from five to forty years. Property donated and held for sale is not depreciated.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions received are recorded as with donor restrictions or without donor restrictions depending on the existence and nature of the donor-imposed stipulations.

Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is received. All other donor-restricted contributions are recorded as increases in donor restricted net assets. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

Donated Services and In-Kind Contributions

Donated services are recognized as contributions only if the services (a) create or enhance non-financial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Presbytery. Although a substantial number of uncompensated volunteers have donated significant amounts of their time to the Presbytery, the value of such donated services has not been recognized as contributions in the financial statements as the recognition criteria was not met.

Functional Expenses

The Presbytery considers all disbursements to be related to its programs and therefore does not allocate disbursements between program, general and administration and fundraising for financial statement presentation.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2021 and 2020

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income Taxes

The Presbytery is exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code (the Code). The Presbytery has been classified as a publicly supported organization which is not a private foundation under Section 509(a) of the Code.

Accounting standards require the Presbytery to evaluate tax positions and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Presbytery has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Presbytery has analyzed the tax positions taken and has concluded that as of December 31, 2021, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require the recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the modified cash basis financial statements. The Presbytery may be subject to audit by the Internal Revenue Service; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Recently Issued Accounting Standards

In September 2020, Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2020-07, *Presentation and Disclosure by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets*. The new guidance, which is effective for the Presbytery on January 1, 2022, is intended to improve transparency in the reporting of contributed nonfinancial assets, also known as gifts-in-kind, for not-for-profit organizations. The ASU requires a not-for-profit organization to present contributed nonfinancial assets as a separate line in the statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets – modified cash basis, apart from contributions of cash or other financial assets. It also requires a not-for-profit entity to enhance disclosures about the valuation of those contributions and their use in programs and other activities, including any donor-imposed restrictions on such use. Management of the Presbytery is currently evaluating the effect that implementation of the amendments in this update will have on the financial statements.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Investments

The Presbytery maintains cash balances in accounts with several financial institutions. The balances in these accounts may exceed applicable insured limits. Management believes that such accounts are maintained with reputable financial institutions and the Presbytery has not experienced any losses in these accounts to date. Cash balances held by TPF are not insured, however, the Presbytery does not believe that it is subject to any unusual risk beyond the normal credit risk associated with other commercial banking relationships. Also, it is the opinion of management that solvency of the TPF is not of particular concern at this time.

The Presbytery invests its funds in the Balanced Pooled Fund administered by the TPF. The TPF manages the assets and maintains separate accounts for each participating entity. The Fund is a balanced fund and assets may be invested in equities, fixed income and cash equivalent securities. Investments are available to be withdrawn upon written notice to TPF and may be restricted to withdrawal on the first business day of the calendar month following ten days written notice.

Investments held at TPF have been valued based on the Presbytery's interest in the pooled funds managed by the TPF, which are evidenced by a unit. The value of a unit is calculated based on the fair value of the underlying assets, adjusted for the effects of such transactions as administrative fees and investment income that has not been reinvested in the underlying assets, as reported by TPF, because there is no ready market for the assets. Valuation based on net asset value used as a practical expedient is permitted and the pooled investments held at TPF are not required to be reported under the investment classification hierarchy.

The full-time employees of the Presbytery participate in the benefit plans of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Contributions are based on percentage of salary and totaled approximately \$7,200 and \$9,500 during the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 6: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Presbytery is a guarantor of a loan totaling \$350,000 from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to a church. The loan is secured by a first mortgage on the real estate owned by the church. This guarantee would require the Presbytery to make the required loan payments in the event the church is unable to do so. Upon default, the real estate would revert to the Presbytery, who could sell the property to pay off the outstanding loan balance. As of December 31, 2021 and 2020, the total outstanding balance was approximately \$92,000 and \$113,000, respectively. The church was current with the required payments at December 31, 2021.

NOTE 7: RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

As of the date of the independent accountant's report, the COVID-19 pandemic has had an adverse impact on both domestic and global financial markets. Management is unable to accurately predict how the COVID-19 pandemic will affect the results of the Presbytery's operations due to uncertainties

Presbytery of Arkansas surrounding the severity of the disease and the duration of the outbreak. However, it is presumed that Presbytery operations will be impacted.

NOTE 8: LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

The Presbytery monitors its liquidity so that it is able to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments while maximizing the investment of its excess operating cash. The Presbytery has unrestricted cash and cash equivalents and investments of approximately \$4,175,000 and \$3,900,000 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively, that could readily be made available within one year of the statement of assets, liabilities and net assets – modified cash basis to fund expenses without limitations.


