Greetings Arkansas Presbyterians!

I preached last Sunday on the Ascension and am in the midst of preparing a sermon for Pentecost. Last week I talked about Karl Barth's designation of this time period between the Ascension and Pentecost as "The Significant Pause". The disciples knew something new and different was coming but they weren't sure what it was. They knew they had a task, to be witnesses for Jesus, but they didn't know how that would unfold. They were assured they would be given power and a presence to guide them along the way to an unknown future.

As I reflect on where we are as a presbytery it seems to me, we are in a similar place. With our ongoing work with Ministry Architects, we know we have a similar task to be witnesses for Jesus, but we know that something new and different is coming and we're not sure what that will be.

Our upcoming presbytery meeting promises to be impactful to our unknown future as we hear from Mark Devries of Ministry Architects. He will share the results of work that has been done for the past several months after numerous listening sessions, a two-day visioning retreat, and several follow-up conversations with various groups in May. I hope that you will be able to prioritize attendance at the June 1 meeting of Presbytery. In addition, we will hear from the Financial Requests Task Force and examine a candidate for ordination.

As a reminder, we will meet on Saturday, June 1 at Central Presbyterian Church in Russellville at 10:00 am. Registration will begin at 9:30 am. For those that can't attend the meeting, we plan to livestream the meeting on Central Presbyterian's Youtube Channel. We will post that link on the presbytery's website with the packet.

Whenever we are faced with such important decisions, anxiety about the unknown and how we will move into that uncertain future is normal. I imagine the disciples felt it during that "significant pause". But I assure you that we have access to the same Holy Spirit that guides and empowers us. And we have great resources in talented, faithful, committed Christians across this presbytery. I look forward to being with many of you in Russellville on June 1, as we continue to discern where the Spirit will lead us in the coming weeks and months!!!

- The church is three blocks down on the right.


Parking Instructions

Section E Report from Youth, Young Adult, and College Ministry

Interim Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministries

At a time when we celebrate the end of the school year, we want to reflect and share the fantastic year in Youth + Young Adult Ministries in the Presbytery of Arkansas. For those who were not able to attend the March Presbytery meeting, our Youth Co-Moderator, Lizzy, recapped the year. Below are some highlights from the past school year, and some summer events we are looking forward to.

Youth Ministry highlights:

- **June 18-23**, **2023**: Junior High youth attended a summer of camp + extra activities at Presby+ event at Ferncliff
- July 9-15, 2023: our senior high youth attended Montreat Youth Conference
- The **Youth Advisory Team (the A-Team) met in August** at the Ferncliff Retreat House to plan and lead events for the Presbytery
- **September 15-17, 2023**: Junior and Senior youth and adult leaders attended Youthquake, an annual youth retreat, at Ferncliff
- In **January we had another A-Team meeting** to continue planning and event leadership for 2024 and beyond
- March 1-2, 2024: Senior High youth attended the Presbytery meeting and learned about polity and the inner workings of a Presbytery meeting
- March 8-10, 2024: 13 youth from five different congregations around the Presbytery attended Presbytery Confirmation Camp, led by Rev. Grant Wildwright and Dr. Sarah Leer, where they spent an entire weekend immersed in confirmation curriculum, followed by digital classes to round out their Confirmation journeys
- **April 19-21, 2024**: Mission: Possible is a weekend trip focused on service; a group of junior high youth and adults served in Mena and were hosted by churches in Hot Springs
- This summer, we will be taking 50 youth and adults to youth conferences Montreat Youth Conference in Black Mountain, NC and Montreat Middle School Conference in Maryville, TN.

Young Adult Ministry highlights:

- We had a great showing at Montreat College Conference in January we had 20 people from around the presbytery traveled together to attend the conference
- University of the Ozarks Spiritual Life led a civil rights tour with 20 students throughout the Deep South during their fall break. They had our first Halloween Chapel service this past fall where our colleague Rev. Marie Mainard O'Connell preached on how Halloween may be the most Christian holiday of all, and they held a study on Sex and the Bible that was written by Arkansas Presbytery's own Rev. Maggie Alsup.
- UCM (U of A ecumenical ministry in Fayetteville):

- Held an open house in our building on April 14, from 3 to 5pm. Their annual Bike a thon fundraiser was on April 27.
- They exceeded our Giving Tuesday campaign goal of \$25000 by nearly \$2000.
- UCM will celebrate 60 Years of our building, now in the National Historic Registry, this fall.
- Lyon College campus ministry -
 - The SOS Pantry (Serve Our Students) is up and running and has a steady flow of students. They see about 40 students a week.
 - Lyon received the Teaching the Bible grant from the PCUSA and are working on our pilot program Sabbath Scholars. It is a group that meets weekly to discuss various meditation and spiritual activities to address mental health, particularly anxiety and depression.

Section F, Exhibit 1 MWS P. Douglas Cartwright, Statement of Faith

I believe in the Triune God, one God in three distinct Persons.

God

I believe in God the Creator, who formed the Universe out of pure and perfect love and imprinted upon humanity God's own image. Unfortunately, this was not enough for God's children. We chose to go our own way, attempted to become like God and diverted from what the Creator intended. This event brought about great pain and even death, infecting creation with sin and suffering. However, God would not allow sin to have the final word. Therefore, the Creator did what we could not do on our own by forming a covenant and fulfilling it despite our inability to do so. Throughout time, God led us through the wilderness and deserts of life, shepherding us through times of peace and even through our darkest hours.

Jesus

I believe in God the Son, who entered this world in order that He might become our hope and salvation. As the Scriptures attest, Jesus ushered in a New Reality and proclaimed that the Kingdom of Heaven had indeed come near. He extended love and grace to the lost, the broken, the lonely, and those that society considered as the least among them. He dined with sinners and associated with outcasts, all the while turning conventional wisdom on its head. While He extended grace freely, His actions came at a price. Although costly, Jesus paid the ultimate price in order to fulfill the Creator's plan. Suffering on the cross, Jesus bore our sins upon Himself, absorbing our offenses and obliterating the powers of sin and death. Rising from the grave, Jesus brought forth light and life, joy and peace, eternal freedom, and redemption.

Holy Spirit

I believe in God the Holy Spirit, the promised Counselor, sent by Christ. The Spirit reveals to us that we are children of the Most High, redeemed by grace, and in need of God's mercy. The Spirit is present with us as we await Christ's final return, empowering the Church to carry out His mission. Gathering us by grace, the Spirit grafts us to Christ by the waters of our baptism, sustains us with Christ's presence at Table in the bread and cup made holy, and assures us that, "In life and in death, we belong to God." The Spirit opens our hearts and minds to the Word proclaimed and exposes our need for transformation so that we might indeed be transformed.

Scriptures

I believe that the Holy Scriptures are inspired by God and hold authority in our lives. I believe that the Scriptures must be studied, interpreted, and preached with great care and an openness to what God is saying to us even today. I believe that, as beloved children, we are free to love, free to live, free to serve, and free to hope in accordance with Scripture as we await Christ's return...all the while, sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Spirit

Section F, Exhibit 2 MWS Ron Gilmer, Statement of Faith

Of all the faith statements in the PC(USA)'s Book of Confessions, I quote "A Brief Statement of Faith" most often. It starts with an allusion to the Heidelberg Catechism's first question and answer after changing an "I" statement into a "we" statement, which reminds us that we were created to connect and are called to love and serve one another: "In life and in death we belong to God."

A Trinitarian blessing, which flows from Christ, follows before attention turns to what each person of the Trinity does. For example, "A Brief Statement of Faith" calls attention to how Jesus proclaims God's reign, preaches good news to the poor, releases captives, teaches by word and deed, blesses children, heals the sick, binds up the broken hearted, eats with outcasts, forgives sinners and calls all to repent and believe the gospel.

The theology of "A Brief Statement of Faith" is both poetic and practical. The sentence in this statement of faith that I have quoted most often in worship is: "Like a mother who will not forsake her nursing child, like a father who runs to welcome the prodigal home, God is faithful still."

I quote this faith statement as often as I do, because it so beautifully reminds me of who I am and who we are. I believe in the Holy Trinity. I trust God's providence and give thanks for God's grace in Jesus Christ, who instituted the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, both of which the church, as the body of Christ, celebrates together.

The faith that I have been given begins and ends with Christ, in whose resurrection is the promise of ours. In the name of Jesus Christ, our sins are forgiven. The Holy Spirit abides with us now and gives us courage "to pray without ceasing." Prayer is but one of a set of spiritual practices that I hold dear -- and holding them, I remember that we are held dear by the One who said, "Let there be light," in the beginning. In Christ, the One who gives us light and life becomes flesh and dwells among us, and thanks be to God, the darkness never overcomes it.

Section F, Exhibit 3 MWS Jesse Gonzales, Statement of Faith

I do believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, and I confess him as my Lord and Savior.

I do believe in God the Father Almighty, creator of everything existing in the terrestrial and cosmic environments. I do believe in God's providence for the entire creation. I do affirm the greatness of God the originator of all ethnic groups; all animal, vegetal and mineral species; and the elements of nature.

I do believe in the comforting presence and action of the Holy Spirit who is empowering and guiding the Universal Church in which the Presbyterian Church USA and the Reformed tradition are included.

I do believe that the Holy Scriptures spanned through the Old & New Testaments contain the will of God and the good news of Jesus Christ for the benefit of the entire creation. In the revelation of God's covenants with humanity resides the authority of the Scriptures and I submit myself to such authority by the grace received from God called faith.

I do declare that I am an imperfect being serving a perfect Lord. I do declare that in the midst of the cosmic powers fighting in my body and mind I submit myself to the Sovereignty of God and to the Apostolic authority of the Church; and to both I am accountable.

I do declare my commitment to the Call of Jesus Christ to be his servant as Teaching Elder for both believers and non-believers regardless of social or immigration status, and physical conditions. I do believe that in Jesus Christ I was predestined to proclaim the Kingdom of God that is established in the Hope that the Lord is coming again to do justice to the living and to the dead in terminating all corruption and suffering.

Section F, Exhibit 4 Elizabeth Cahoon, Statement of Faith

I believe in God, the Almighty, revealed to us in the form of three persons: God, the Creator; Jesus Christ, the Redeemer; and the Holy Spirit, the Sustainer. I believe it is through God we are molded into God's image. I believe it is through the life and death of Jesus Christ, fully human, fully God, we witness the great sacrificial love of God. I believe it is through the Holy Spirit we are able to share that love with all of God's children. I believe all three were at work in the creation of the universe and continue to have an active role in sustaining grace.

God's providence unfolds into three forms of benevolent intervention: the protection of all creation, the accompaniment of humanity, and in directing the story of God's children. God reveals this to us through the life of Jesus Christ and through the power of the Holy Spirit. I believe in the traditions of the Reformed Faith – that by grace alone, faith alone, and scripture alone – we are empowered to live a life of faith.

I believe in a confessional and confessing faith. Like an anchor for a ship, a confession of faith centers Christians to the Gospel, while also allowing us to explore doubts without fear of losing our beliefs.

I believe the Son of God, Jesus Christ, was born of Mary and lived among enemies and friends, experiencing despair and hope, temptation and peace, anger and joy, hate and love. God sent Jesus to earth, so that we might learn how to live as one community; but gave us Jesus' atoning life, death, and resurrection so that those who believe might be saved as one, eternally in the kingdom of God.

I believe that all people sin and fall short of the glory of God, but it is by the grace of God we are forgiven. I believe in God's beloved community, that people of every race, gender, sexual orientation, identity, and age are welcome in the kingdom of heaven.

The Bible is the living Word of God. As an extension of God, it is prevalent for Christians from different generations of time, therefore it was not written from one monolithic voice, but used different voices. We read the Bible through the Holy Spirit to not only understand God's divine will, but also to experience the expansive love and grace of Jesus Christ.

As followers of Christ, the Church is called to serve with a heart filled with loving-kindness for all of God's creation: humankind, the earth, and all creatures that live among us. I believe as Christians we are also called to reflect the life of Jesus Christ by feeding the hungry, providing water to the thirsty, clothing the naked, caring for the sick, visiting the imprisoned and welcoming the stranger. In doing so we answer Christ's Great Commission: to go and make disciples of all nations.

I believe that in Baptism we are claimed by God, washed clean of sin, called to a new way of life as Jesus' disciples, and united in God's eternal kingdom with the holy communion of saints. At Communion, with God as our host, we testify the offered bread and cup, as signs of Jesus Christ's body and blood broken for us, so that we may live without fear of death.

I believe in the spirit of Advent, that Jesus Christ will come again as he promised, to unite all believers: past, present, and those to come. In Christ's return there will be an end to all sufferings of this world and we will live as one eternally in the kingdom of God.

Section H

Report from the Committee on Administration

MWS Carl McCormack, HR Moderator

The Committee on Administration met May 15, 2024, via ZOOM, with a quorum of five.

With sadness and sorrow we recognized the death of one of our newest members, RE Mary Ellen Holder.

Reports:

The committee received a report from the presbytery administrator and the presbytery treasurer giving us a review of the April 2024 financials. Most notably the presbytery is under budget on expenses, and over budget on the spend rate from our investment account. Both items are good news.

The General Presbyter reported that two properties are under contract for sale: Stuttgart, First and Lincoln, First for a total of \$190,000. Little Rock, Westminster has been listed for sale, and Marianna, First should be listed by June 15. The gift of Eureka Springs, First to the Eureka Springs Library has met with some roadblocks at the city council level. The Brinkley, First and North Little Rock, First (Argenta) properties have closed with a total of \$1,100,000. He mentioned two congregations that have sold or are in the process of selling their property to get out from under the burden of expense on the property, and reminded the committee that the real assets of a church remain with the church as long as long as they are a functioning congregation.

Old Business:

The presbytery was dropped by Church Mutual Insurance, but Insurance Board, the insurance provider preferred by our denomination, has taken on our policy with an approximate cost of \$17,000 from April 7, 2024 to January 1, 2025. The deductible has risen sharply to 5% of the value of the covered property.

New Business:

The Transitional General Presbyter Search Committee had asked for a minimum and maximum effective salary amount to be communicated with Church Leadership Connection of the PCUSA. In light of current salary expense levels, a motion was made, seconded, and approved to give the Search Committee the amounts of \$80,000 - \$95,000 for the position.

At the recommendation of the General Presbyter and discussion of the committee, a motion was made, seconded, and approved to give the committees on the Mission of the Church and the Future of the Church access to monies outside their budgeted expenses in the amount of \$20,000 from the Church Development/Redevelopment Fund to be used for additional grant requests from our churches.

There is no motion to be brought before the Presbytery at this time.



NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization and Operations

The Presbytery of Arkansas (the Presbytery) exists as a religious entity under the Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). As such, their mission is to inspire, challenge and help the congregation, agencies, ministers, and leaders to fulfill the call to service as faithful followers of Jesus Christ.

The Presbytery is made up of 76 Presbyterian churches located throughout Arkansas. The membership of the Presbytery includes all Ministers of member churches and ruling elders elected by member congregations. The Committee on Administration oversees the budget and financial operations of the Presbytery and may designate certain assets to be used first as support for certain programs and activities and, if not needed, then for general operations. Principal revenues of the Presbytery are primarily from benevolence received from the member churches. All of the Presbytery's expenditures are for the programs which benefit these churches and members.

Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The financial statements are prepared using the modified cash basis of accounting. Under this basis, certain revenues and related assets are recognized when cash is received rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when they are paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. This basis differs from generally accepted accounting principles primarily because these financial statements do not include promises to give from church members or amounts due to vendors and employees for goods and services received prior to year-end for which payment had not been made as of year-end.

Basis of Presentation

The Presbytery presents information regarding financial position and activities according to the following two classes of net assets:

<u>Net Assets without Donor Restrictions</u>—Net assets that are not subject to or are no longer subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

<u>Net Assets with Donor Restrictions</u>—Net assets whose use is limited by donor-imposed time and/ or purpose restrictions.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of demand deposit accounts maintained with financial institutions and cash and highly liquid investments with maturities of three months or less held by the Texas Presbyterian Foundation (TPF).

Investments

The Presbytery's investments are reported at fair value. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly fashion between market participants at the measurement date. Investment return includes realized and unrealized gains and losses and interest income received. Investment income and gains restricted by donors are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restrictions are met (either a stipulated time period ends or a purpose restriction is accomplished) during the reporting period in which the income and gains are

recognized and are appropriated for expenditure. Otherwise, income and gains are reported as increases in net assets with donor restrictions.

Notes Receivable

Notes receivables consist of unsecured emergency loans to churches and pastors within the region governed by the Presbytery. The receivables at December 31, 2023 include a receivable of approximately \$975,000 due from the buyer of one of the properties held for sale. Notes receivable bear zero percent interest and are generally due within one to three years. Management has determined that all amounts are fully collectible and no allowance for credit losses is necessary.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at historical cost or, if donated, at the approximate fair value at the date of donation. Major renewals and betterments in excess of \$1,000 are capitalized, while normal repairs and maintenance are expensed in the period incurred. Depreciation of these assets is calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, ranging from five to forty years. Property donated and held for sale is not depreciated.

Revenue Recognition

Contributions received are recorded as with donor restrictions or without donor restrictions depending on the existence and nature of the donor-imposed stipulations.

Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in net assets without donor restrictions if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is received. All other donor-restricted contributions are recorded as increases in donor restricted net assets. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statements of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

Donated Services and In-Kind Contributions

Donated services are recognized as contributions only if the services (a) create or enhance non- financial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Presbytery. Although a substantial number of uncompensated volunteers have donated significant amounts of their time to the Presbytery, the value of such donated services has not been recognized as contributions in the financial statements as the recognition criteria was not met.

Functional Expenses

The Presbytery considers all disbursements to be related to its programs and therefore does not allocate disbursements between program, general and administration and fundraising for financial statement presentation.

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2023 and 2022

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income Taxes

The Presbytery is exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code (the Code). The Presbytery has been classified as a publicly supported organization which is not a private foundation under Section 509(a) of the Code.

Accounting standards require the Presbytery to evaluate tax positions and recognize a tax liability (or asset) if the Presbytery has taken an uncertain position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by the Internal Revenue Service. The Presbytery has analyzed the tax positions taken and has concluded that as of December 31, 2023, there are no uncertain positions taken or expected to be taken that would require the recognition of a liability (or asset) or disclosure in the modified cash basis financial statements. The Presbytery may be subject to audit by the Internal Revenue Service; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

The Presbytery maintains cash balances in accounts with several financial institutions. The balances in these accounts may exceed applicable insured limits. Management believes that such accounts are maintained with reputable financial institutions and the Presbytery has not experienced any losses in these accounts to date. Cash balances held by TPF are not insured, however, the Presbytery does not believe that it is subject to any unusual risk beyond the normal credit risk associated with other commercial banking relationships. Also, it is the opinion of management that solvency of the TPF is not of particular concern at this time.

Investments

The Presbytery invests its funds in the Balanced Pooled Fund administered by the TPF. The TPF manages the assets and maintains separate accounts for each participating entity. The Fund is a balanced fund and assets may be invested in equities, fixed income and cash equivalent securities. Investments are available to be withdrawn upon written notice to TPF and may be restricted to withdrawal on the first business day of the calendar month following ten days written notice.

Investments (Continued)

Investments held at TPF have been valued based on the Presbytery's interest in the pooled funds managed by the TPF, which are evidenced by a unit. The value of a unit is calculated based on the fair value of the underlying assets, adjusted for the effects of such transactions as administrative fees and investment income that has not been reinvested in the underlying assets, as reported by TPF, because there is no ready market for the assets. Valuation based on net asset value used as a practical expedient is permitted and the pooled investments held at TPF are not required to be reported under the investment classification hierarchy.

NOTE 4: RETIREMENT ARRANGEMENT WITH STAFF EMPLOYEES

The full-time employees of the Presbytery participate in the benefit plans of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Contributions are based on percentage of salary and totaled approximately \$7,300 during each of the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022.

Net assets with donor restrictions consist of the Irene W. Meredith Trust and the Hispanic Ministry contributions received by the Presbytery. NOTE 7: COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The Presbytery is a guarantor of a loan totaling \$350,000 from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to a church. The loan is secured by a first mortgage on the real estate owned by the church. This guarantee would require the Presbytery to make the required loan payments in the event the church is unable to do so. Upon default, the real estate would revert to the Presbytery, who could sell the property to pay off the outstanding loan balance. As of December 31, 2023 and 2022, the total outstanding balance was approximately \$60,000 and \$77,000, respectively. The church was current with the required payments at December 31, 2023.



NOTE 8: LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

The Presbytery monitors its liquidity so that it is able to meet its operating needs and other contractual commitments while maximizing the investment of its excess operating cash. The Presbytery has unrestricted cash and cash equivalents and investments of approximately \$4,200,000 and \$3,500,000 at December 31, 2023 and 2022, respectively, that could readily be made available within one year of the statement of assets, liabilities and net assets – modified cash basis to fund expenses without limitations.

NOTE 9: SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Presbytery has evaluated events that occurred after December 31, 2023, but prior to March 21, 2024, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Presbyterian to English Cheat Sheet

From time to time abbreviations and acronyms will be peppered through the meeting. The following is a quick primer on Presby-speak. If you have questions about any of these terms or the way they fit into the larger picture of the life of the church, feel free to ask the Stated Clerk!

- *AC* An <u>A</u>dministrative <u>C</u>ommission is a group of Ministers of the Word and Sacrament and Ruling Elders given specific responsibilities and authority to act on behalf of the presbytery between meetings. They are typically formed to ordain and/or install pastors, perform the tasks associated with dismissing, closing, or merging congregations, deal with difficulties in a particular church, or assist a church in times of transition.
- **Board of Pensions-** The General Assembly agency charged with overseeing the benefits plans for pastors and some other church employees.
- *Candidate-* A person in the latter portion of the ordination process for the ministry of Minister of the Word and Sacrament.
- **COM-** The <u>Committee on Ministry provides oversight and advocacy for congregations and Ministers of the Word and Sacrament. It receives Ministers of the Word and Sacrament from other presbyteries, approves calls for pastoral services, oversees congregations without pastors, dissolves pastoral relationships, dismisses Ministers of the Word and Sacrament to other presbyteries, determines of the criteria for validating ministries of non-parish clergy, and oversees Commissioned Ruling Elders serving congregations.</u>
- *CPM* The <u>Committee on <u>P</u>reparation for <u>M</u>inistry oversees the process of preparation for the ministry of Ministers of Word and Sacrament, training of Commissioned Ruling Elders, and the process of certification for Christian Educators.</u>
- *Council* In the context of Presbyterian polity and governance, a council is a governing body of the church. The councils of the PC(USA) are the session, the presbytery, the synod and the General Assembly.
- *CT* The <u>C</u>oordinating <u>T</u>eam of the presbytery acts on the presbytery's behalf on routine matters between stated meetings, coordinates the ministries of the presbytery, and plans for presbytery meetings.
- *GA* The <u>General Assembly of the PC(USA) is the highest council of the church. It meets in even numbered years for a week. The 2020 meeting will be held June 16-23 in Baltimore, Maryland.</u>
- *HR* <u>H</u>onorably <u>R</u>etired is a designation for Ministers of the Word and Sacrament retired from active service to the church who remain in good standing with the PC(USA).
- *Inquirer-* A person in the initial phase of the process of preparation for ministry as a Minister of Word and Sacrament.
- *MIF-* A <u>Ministry Information Form is the standardized format for advertising certain church professional positions through the PC(USA) Church Leadership Connection.</u>
- MWS \underline{M} inister of the \underline{W} ord and \underline{S} acrament is an ordained Presbyterian minister member of the clergy, formerly called a \underline{T} eaching \underline{E} lder.
- *Moderator* The Moderator is the person elected to keep order and chair the meetings of the presbytery. The pastor or CRE of a local congregation serves as the moderator of the local session.
- *NCD* New Church Developments are new ministries of the presbytery engaged in a formal process to work toward establishing a new congregation.

- **PDA-** Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is an agency of the Presbyterian Church (USA) Mission Agency. PDA assists communities coping with natural and human-caused disasters.
- *PJC* Permanent Judicial Commission implements the disciplinary procedures required by the *Book of Order*. There is a Judicial Process Manual which gives details on these duties.
- **PMA-** The <u>Presbyterian Mission Agency is part of the larger PC(USA) and is located at national church headquarters in Louisville, KY.</u>
- **PNC-** Pastor Nominating Committee is a search committee elected by a congregation to seek, interview, and recommend a new pastor.
- **RE/Ruling Elder-** Ruling Elder is a lay member of a congregation who has been elected, ordained and installed to serve on the session of a church. Ruling elders are eligible for election as commissioners to presbytery, synod and General Assembly. Once ordained as a ruling elder one maintains that office whether serving on a session or not.
- **Stated Clerk** Stated Clerk is the officer elected by the presbytery to maintain the official records, provide extracts when asked, prepare the docket for presbytery meetings, and answer questions about the records, Presbyterian polity, policies, procedures and history. The Stated Clerk is authorized to certify ministers and congregations are in good standing and qualify under the tax exemption of the PC(USA).
- **Synod of the Sun-** The governing body council which includes all the presbyteries in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. It coordinates the work of the PC(USA) in this region.
- *TPF-* <u>Texas Presbyterian Foundation is a financial service organization for Presbyterian members, councils and institutions. It invests funds and provides bookkeeping services for Arkansas Presbytery.</u>
- *Validated Ministries-* Positions served by chaplains, professors and other Ministers of the Word and Sacrament who are not currently serving a congregation. Sometimes they are referred to as non-parish clergy.

Tips for Commissioners on Procedure and Parliamentary Practice

Parliamentary procedure enables the presbytery to become a deliberative assembly, to seek the will of God and to witness to our faith in Jesus Christ. It is never an end in itself. <u>Parliamentary gamesmanship is never appropriate</u>. The will of the majority shall prevail, but the rights of the minority shall always be protected. Parliamentary principles balance individual conscience with the will of the majority. It takes seriously the following rights of individual members:

- (1) the right to know (due notice)
- (2) the right to speak (rules of debate)
- (3) the right to vote (membership)
- (4) the right to hold office (fair representation)

The Moderator represents the unity of the body. The Moderator preserves decorum and protects the rights listed above.

Parliamentary procedure allows discussion of a subject only when a motion about that subject has been made. To speak during the meeting, first go to a microphone. When recognized by the Moderator, state your name, church, city and status – such as Minister of the Word and Sacrament, Ruling Elder, or Honorably Retired. You may speak to a pending motion or ask a question. The person making the motion will have the first opportunity to speak to the motion. Only motions coming from individuals need a second. A motion made on behalf of a ministry area or a committee already has a second because it is the majority vote of the committee.

Ordinarily, only commissioners may speak and vote on motions (Minister of Word and Sacrament members of the Presbytery; Ruling Elders elected by their Session; Ruling Elders elected as General Presbyter, Stated Clerk, Assistant Stated Clerk, Treasurer, Moderator, or Moderator-in-Waiting (Vice Moderator); Commissioned Ruling Elders in current service; members of the Coordinating Team; current commissioners to General Assembly; and Ruling Elders who are Certified Christian Educators).

At the Spring meeting of the Presbytery Youth Advisory Delegates and Young Adult Advisory Delegates have "privilege of the floor," meaning that they have permission to speak to motions, and they take an advisory vote prior to the vote by commissioners. At any meeting someone in attendance may be given privilege of the floor, allowing that person to speak to the body, which is ordinarily given near the beginning of the meeting. Privilege of the floor does not mean that person may vote.

It is advisable to speak only once on a subject, but you may seek to speak a second time only after everyone who wishes to speak has spoken. All remarks during debate shall be addressed to the Moderator. Questions seeking information from a person who has the floor shall be addressed to the Moderator. Speeches to an individual or the whole presbytery are not permitted during debate. Reading reports or documents out loud requires the permission of the body. In debate, remarks shall be confined to the pending motion. Remarks shall not impugn another commissioner or that person's motives. Commissioners' names shall not be used.

To end debate, a commissioner must go to a microphone and, when recognized by the Moderator, state: "I move the previous question." It is not appropriate to call the question without going to a microphone. If you offer a substitute motion or a new item of business, you should give the Moderator and Stated Clerk advance notice and written copy. An electronic copy is preferred – using Microsoft Word on a memory stick or thumb drive. Not only will this help these officers facilitate the work of presbytery, they may also be

able to help you with suggestions as to how and when it would be appropriate to make the motion. The Stated Clerk and the Moderator are available to advise commissioners on the wording of any motion so that it can clearly express the concerns of the commissioner. When in doubt, ask. The Moderator and the Stated Clerk are eager to help you understand and use the process.

Commissioners should always read all information provided in the packets and subsequent information provided at the registration table. Whenever possible questions concerning reports or motions should be directed to the Moderator of a ministry area or committee making the report or motion prior to the meeting. Contact info on moderators may be obtained through the presbytery office. Often concerns may be cleared up prior to a meeting rather than on the floor of presbytery.
